# Conservancy planning colorful events in April

April activities are blooming for the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy.

The group will participate in this weekend's Theodore Payne Native Plant Garden Tour, 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

For the first time, the event will include a self-guided tour of the White Point Nature Education Center and Preserve in San Pedro: [nativeplantgardentour.org/gardens/garden-10-in-san-pedro/](http://nativeplantgardentour.org/gardens/garden-10-in-san-pedro/).

On April 21, the conservancy will host an outdoor volunteer day and a choice of family activities at White Point from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

was founded 1988, successfully preserving 1,600 acres of open space on the Palos Verdes Peninsula for historical, educational, ecological, recreational and scenic purposes. The Conservancy, with the support of hundreds of volunteers year-round, restores native habitat on these properties and protects rare and threatened native species such as the California gnatcatcher and Palos Verdes blue butterfly.

The Conservancy operates a native plant nursery in San Pedro that propagates more than 60 different species.
