## Grow Our Legacy- Preserve Filiorum

In 1988 an aerospace engineer and his wife strolled along one of the myriad of trails that criss-cross the south side of the Peninsula. They marveled that this spectacular coastal land was still undeveloped and resolved to try and preserve it!

Twenty years later, that engineer, Bill Ailor, the Founding President of the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy says that the community should be justifiably proud of the 1200-acre mosaic of open space land that they have created on the Peninsula. The heart of this open space is the Portuguese Bend Reserve that stretches from the Three Sisters area west of Abalone Cove all the way down to the Forrestal area above the Trump National Golf Club. Well not quite all the way ... yet!

"We've worked really hard, along with the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, to acquire the last remaining block of open space that links together the previously preserved lands in the Portuguese Bend area," said Henry Jurgens, president of the PVPLC. "And we are delighted to have now reached an agreement to acquire that property from York Long Point Associates."



The agreement calls for acquiring the 190-acre Upper Filiorum and the 28-acres Plum Tree parcels of land (see map on page 2.) Bill Ailor, who is currently a board member, and Liz Kennedy, the executive vice-president of the PVPLC will spearhead the Conservancy's effort to complete the acquisition by the end of March 2009.

The 218 acres of open land overlooking the ocean is home to rare coastal sage habitat and several rare and threatened species that thrive in this environment. These parcels are the missing link needed to connect two existing nature public preserves. Several trails traverse through these parcels, boasting magnificent views of the ocean. This land would be available to the community when the area is acquired by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and dedicated for public use.

"This land is critical because it establishes a contiguous nature preserve that will serve as a vital corridor to help the resurgence of natural communities on our Preserves" said Liz Kennedy.



This land holds areas of coastal sage scrub habitat, southern cactus scrub habitat and has the potential for habitat restoration on many more acres. It is home to a bird listed as threatened on the Endangered Species list, the California gnatcatcher, and the rare cactus wren. In fact, the Palos Verdes Peninsula is estimated to have the largest population of California gnatcatchers in Los Angeles County. The acquisition land is also a prime reintroduction site for the endangered Palos Verdes blue butterfly since the property has remnant locations of the food plant of this butterfly.

Acquiring this land will expand the Portuguese Bend Reserve to over 900 contiguous acres and increase the open space managed by the PVPLC to 1,400 acres, an area 40% larger than San Francisco's Golden Gate Park.

Total acquisition cost of the property is approximately \$12.2 million with government agencies targeted to provide about \$8.1 million. The remaining amount must be raised from the community and other sources in order to close the transaction by the end of March 2009.

"We are developing plans for a public campaign to raise \$4 million to acquire the properties. This is a unique opportunity for the community, at last, to complete the Portuguese Bend Preserve," said Liz Kennedy.

A capital campaign committee is being formed and in the coming months a formal announcement of the campaign will be made.

"When the Vanderlip family, who owned most of the land on the Peninsula, had a choice of building their home anywhere, they chose this area and called it Filiorum, which is Latin for "of the sons", said Bill Ailor. "And that sentiment of preserving land for future generations is the legacy we'll leave by preserving Filiorum".

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## Portuguese Bend Reserve is Open!

In conjunction with National Trails Day, the Conservancy celebrated the grand opening of the trail system of the Portuguese Bend Reserve on Friday June 6th, 2008. With the exception of fire roads, all trails had been temporarily closed by Rancho Palos Verdes City Council for nearly 6 months, but the highly anticipated Preserve Trails Plan that was approved on February 23, 2008 has now been implemented.

"It's wonderful that we can welcome everyone back to the Preserve as the whole country celebrated National Trails Day," said Andrea Vona, Executive Director of the Conservancy. "It's so fitting that this day promotes not only an appreciation for America's trails but also encourages cooperative efforts among different trail users, including hikers, bicyclists, equestrians, walkers, and runners, all who enjoy being on the trails."

The Conservancy also hosted a Trail Workday on June 7th at the Portuguese Bend Reserve. The workday was co-sponsored by REI and CORBA. Nearly 60 volunteers worked on both the Eagle's Nest Trail and the Toyon Trail to create well-defined trails that are free of debris.

Bernice Abellera said, "It was the second time my running friends and I had volunteered and it truly was a marvelous and rewarding experience. I have given myself a mission to spread awareness of the importance of taking care of Mother Nature and will continue being involved in your volunteer activities."

Since the opening there have been hundreds of people enjoying the trails. The

Conservancy has installed informational trail markers throughout, as well as trail maps which are available at trailhead locations. "We are absolutely delighted to have the trails open to the public again," said Henry Jurgens, President of the Conservancy. "We appreciate the patience and understanding of the community in abiding by the restrictions over the past several months."

# Education Update

The Conservancy's mission is "Preserving land and restoring habitat for the enjoyment and **education** of all" and is committed to educating people about the importance of conservation and the natural world. Through an expanding education program we have been working to build "nature awareness" for many years. The goal is to reach all ages and offer scientifically accurate and inspiring messages of conservation, whether they are to a 3rd grader on a field trip or an adult on a monthly nature walk.

The Conservancy offers many opportunities for people to be out in nature. Some of these are:

- With dedicated volunteers and a certified naturalist on-site, visitors to George F Canyon Nature Center and Preserve can spend an hour or two on weekends hiking and learning more about the history of the area.

- Since 1995, the 3rd grade Education Program has been connecting young learners to the wonders of local ecosystems in ways consistent with current academic standards.

- Partnership with the LA Conservation Corps continues, which allows education opportunities to under-served 6th through 8th grade students. To date, over 160 middle school students from South Los Angeles neighborhoods have taken educational nature hikes through the George F Canyon and White Point Nature Preserves. One child said, "Nature is so beautiful, I love it here and I want to come back."

- The popular monthly Nature Walk series reach out to the general public and connect the community to the wonderful natural open spaces in their own back yard.

- The Conservancy began a family walking series called "Nature Center Without Walls" at the White Point Nature Preserve. The walk explores the local landscape and are sprinkled with trail games and activities for the kids. Walks occur the 3rd Saturday of every month and are from 9-10am, through August. There is also an information booth available with nature crafts for the kids.

- The Conservancy also works extensively with Eagle Scouts and Girl Scout Gold and Silver Award hopefuls on many projects throughout the preserves. Some projects have included the fabrication and installation of owl boxes and building trails as well as developing self guided trail brochures for the public.



## El Segundo Blue Butterfly

The Palos Verdes Peninsula is home to two endangered butterfly species. While most people are familiar with the Palos Verdes blue butterfly, the other species is the El Segundo blue butterfly. This tiny butterfly spends its entire lifecycle on the dune buckwheat within local coastal areas.

Two years ago, El Segundo blue butterflies were discovered living on the steep cliffs around Pt. Vicente, but not in areas above the cliffs. Since then, several restoration efforts have planted dune buckwheat in the South Bay, including the Point Vicente Interpretive Center, Torrance Beach, Redondo Beach, and Dockweiler Beach. And the El Segundo blue butterfly have been found at these sites, thanks to the restoration efforts.

The Conservancy is providing habitat for this endangered species on the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve. The efforts will help expand the El Segundo blue butterfly's population and take it one more step away from becoming extinct!

## RECIPE Celebrates its Two Year Anniversary

The Research, Education and Community Involvement Program for the Environment (RECIPE) was created in June 2006 with a generous grant from the Alcoa Foundation. At the two-year mark, there is much to celebrate.

The program aims to reach students from elementary through university level to foster sound scientific education and provide research opportunities.

During the past two years RECIPE's major accomplishments include:

- Produced more than 80 research projects completed by over 100 participants.
- The creation of a Science Advisory Panel with over 31 members.
- Participated in 13 research projects completed by 9 college interns.
- 31 high school students have conducted hands-on research on the Conservancy's preserves, often with a Science Advisory Panel member.
- Began developing a weather station array to be installed at middle school classrooms.

RECIPE projects will continue to incorporate all students who will experience hands-on natural science research while providing needed answers to Conservancy and the restoration community at large.

## STEWARDSHIP, RESTORATION, AND EDUCATION UPDATES

### RECIPE Student Goes to Harvard

Kristen Hunter started a RECIPE project in the fall of 2006 and the experience has paid off, she has been accepted to Harvard University. From the array of research projects needed at the Conservancy she chose to study weather on the Peninsula, focusing on microclimates.

After interviewing retired weatherman Don Gales, a visit to see a TV weather broadcast at KTTV with weatherman Rick Dickert, and an internship at Jet Propulsion Laboratory with meteorologist William Patzert, Kristen produced an analytical report detailing how rainfall and temperatures varied around the Peninsula.

The Conservancy will use this valuable information to develop site-specific restoration plans. Kristen said, "Working on a microclimate project through the RECIPE program allowed me to learn about and contribute to an exciting topic I knew very little about. I also learned basic research skills, and gained abilities such as an in-depth understanding of Excel, using statistics in real-world situations, and presenting research in a clear manner."

This shows that our RECIPE students take their work very seriously and some hope to continue their careers in a related field. Kristen continues, "I hope to do science research as an undergraduate, which will help me evaluate and obtain research positions in my chosen field." The Conservancy wishes Kristen success as she continues her education.

### Rare Plant coming back to the Peninsula

The Catalina Crossosoma (*Crossosoma californicum*) is one of the Peninsula's special plants, considered rare and endangered in California and elsewhere. It is found on the Palos Verdes Peninsula primarily on rocky, hard-to-reach locations within the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve. The shrubby small tree is present on some of the Channel Islands, including San Clemente and Santa Catalina, as well as Mexico's Guadalupe Island. This plant has delicate beautiful white flowers, however, it doesn't bloom for long (February-May), doesn't tolerate cold weather, and grows in rocky, often steep terrain.

The exciting news is that a small amount of seed was gathered in 2006 from the population in the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve and PVPLC nursery staff began propagation. Known to be difficult to grow in the nursery setting, staff was able to transplant several dozen, which now wait to be planted out on the nature preserves. Placed in the full sun to adapt to outside conditions, two of the plants flowered in the nursery this past Spring!
